Oddly enough, the wise cracking comments ceased and the young man that she tried to keep grounded came around. We turned into friends. Judi soon became an unofficial member of my family. She developed a tie with my parents, both of whom worked in the school system. In a sense, I guess she became a hardnosed sister for me. We graduated together after those years and stayed in touch by phone. She was in Florida and I was in Maryland.
